



In time, in order, in respect

On June 1, the school held the June school assembly. At the beginning of the meeting, "Nosho-shiki" was held. The students who achieved excellent results in the Oku-Noto Tournament (table tennis, soft tennis, and kendo) and the Noto District Track and Field Championships lined up proudly at the front of the gymnasium and brought home awards for our school. They all did their best with the determination to give their all, and they truly deserve another round of applause for their efforts and achievements.

On the day of the tournaments, the principal and vice-principal visited several venues to watch the students compete. As expected, many students looked nervous before and during their matches. Some even said, "I'm so nervous..." When students came close to me before their events, I sent them off with high-fives and a "Good luck!" However, many of them looked so focused and tense that I hesitated to say much more. While watching the competitions, I found myself naturally hoping and praying that each student would be able to perform to the best of their ability.

One of our class has chosen the phrase "**Bonji Tettei**" as part of its class motto this year. This Japanese expression means doing ordinary things thoroughly and consistently -in other words, practicing the things we should do every day and doing them well. Why is this important? I asked the students this question during the assembly. One student replied, "Because when we do the things we are supposed to do properly, **people come to trust us.**" I then introduced the phrase "in time, in order, in respect".

"In time" means keeping time, meeting deadlines and honoring commitments.

"In order" means organizing and cleaning the spaces around us and maintaining a pleasant environment.

"In respect" means greeting others properly, responding appropriately and good manners.

Educational philosopher Nobuzo Mori said that this is "the basic attitude of being a good person." It not only helps us gain the trust of others and build good relationships, but I also believe it **helps us become more confident and develop our abilities.** Doing what we should do every day and continuing to do it may sound easy, but it is often difficult. However, even making a small effort, succeeding once, or continuing little by little is something to be proud of. I think that is what makes it truly amazing.

Along with practicing "Bonji Tettei"—doing ordinary things thoroughly and consistently—I hope that Anamizu junior high school students will continue to act with the principles of "being on time, keeping their surroundings clean, and showing respect" in mind. I also hope that all students will put these principles into action during the Community Clean-Up Activity scheduled for Thursday, June 11th. By working together and demonstrating these values, our students can set a positive example for the community. I believe that such actions can become a source of hope for the region's recovery and revitalization.
